The Research & Strategic Partnerships department was formed in January 2023 to coordinate research, policy, and advocacy efforts by supporting strategic relationship-building efforts across the organization.

In February 2023, First Voice released **Our Shared Vision**, a Community Action Plan informed by more than 3 years of sustained engagements with the urban Indigenous community and a variety of other rightsholders, stakeholders, decision-makers, and policy experts.

The ambitious ten-year plan outlines 42 Calls for Change inspired by the TRC, MMIWG, and UNDRIP. The Calls describe how all residents in St. John's and across the province can work alongside diverse urban Indigenous Peoples to address the ongoing legacy of colonialism.
