- Talk to your children about what happened, and how every child matters
- Read books\* that educate on residential schools or reconciliaton:

  - The Secret Path
- \* We recommend looking through all resources before introducing them to your children. While stories about residential schools are extremely important, it can be a very difficult topic, and it's important to make sure the videos/stories are appropriate for them.
